

We live in a culture in decline - spiritual and otherwise. One of the consequences of this has been the denigration of males as passive, toxic, and immature. Dr. Anthony Bradley, Professor of Religious Studies, The King's College, New York City, has been observing, studying, and writing about this phenomenon for over 20 years. Besides describing the longterm devastating effects of this trend and what hasn't worked, he has prescribed some helpful practices. These included men, among other things, coming alongside boys, teaching them, and encouraging them.





About a year and a half ago, Mr. Krooswyk and I began discussing the negative effects that our broader culture, as described above, has on men and boys and how we might "flip the script" for junior high boys at Highland Christian School. Determined to be part of the solution, we formed a coalition and planned an

activity which would bring men and boys together for a time of informative fellowship. The initial activity involved men speaking about their situations and occupations with the goal of bonding and encouragement amongst the boys in a Christian setting. Four men from our school community, Mr. Jeremias Alicea, parent and teen educator; Mr. Llovd Colar, parent and youth leader; Mr. Juan Cruz, youth pastor; and Mr. David Sherwood, parent and HCS coach, enthusiastically supported the idea as did the HCS School Board of Directors.

Mr. Krooswyk and I are deeply appreciative of the time these four men are investing in our young boys' lives. Following an initial organizational meeting, we agreed that it would be reasonable to meet once a month, with the first meeting on Jan 28, 2022. As any good gathering does, these monthly meetings involve





a speaker, some time for fun, and good food. One of the highlights of our February meeting was the catering done by a dad, Mr. Herman Miller, who runs his own business - Herm's Grill. Monthly meetings will be scheduled ideally for the last Friday of each month from 3:30 to 5:30.

Mr. Alicea, Mr. Colar, and Mr. Cruz have participated as speakers and leaders. Mr. Dan Kuiper, an HCS alum, will speak for the April meeting. Attendance has been outstanding and affirms the need for opportunities like this. As we forge ahead with plans for the next school year, we invite you to influence and build up these young men with us!

# Supporting Student Learning

For many years Northwest Indiana Special Education Cooperative (NISEC) has been responsible for providing occupational therapy, physical therapy and speech/language therapy for students at Highland Christian School. While we have benefited greatly from this partnership, over time, service provision has changed.

NISEC serves a total of 8 school districts, which includes many private schools. Because these providers are shared, they provide services when their schedule allows, not necessarily when it works best for the student. At times students are pulled from their classroom during core instruction, such as math or reading, to receive

occupational therapy or speech/language services. Currently, students with speech/language needs in our building receive services through a virtual platform called Tiny Eye. Having students participate in virtual speech/language services is not ideal.

In order to best serve the students with these needs, we have begun the process of moving away from NISEC services. While NISEC will still be responsible for evaluating students, when a need for service is determined, we will work with the family to create a plan to deliver the necessary services.

To this end, **Highland Christian School has the opportunity to access funding earmarked for student support services** and will be hiring our own **Speech/Language Pathologist, Occupational Therapist and Physical Therapist**. Having our own staff to work with students at ideal times and provide the best quality services is our goal.

Giving each child what they need to succeed is one way we live into our calling of ensuring that students are academically equipped. While this is a great step forward in meeting student needs, services will still be limited to the mild to moderate range of need.

We recognize the balance of responsibility and need for honesty with families about what we can offer and what needs we are able to meet. By providing these services with consistency and integrity, we hope to further support enrolled HCS students who have speech, processing, and motor skills, that without support, would negatively impact their education.

# **ISSMA**

Highland Christian School students have the opportunity to participate in two Indiana State School Music Association (ISSMA) competitions each year. One event focuses on piano and vocal performance, while the

other event features instrumentals. Students who participate in this competition are evaluated on preparation and performance of their musical piece.

ISSMA judges provide feedback for students to help hone their performance and musical skills. Students are awarded gold, silver, or bronze medals, based on their performance. This is a great opportunity for students to receive an objective educational critique of their musical level and presentation skills.

For several years, HCS fourth graders have been participating in the American Legion's Flag Education Test Program. Each student participating in the Flag Education Test Program takes the same test. The answers on the test are scored against a standardized answer sheet. The "Our Country's Flag" comic book is used as a study guide for the closed book test. The test consists of 20 questions, which vary from multiple choice to true and false. They also write an essay about what the flag means to them. Two students at each participating school are chosen as school winners.

American Legion members commented that HCS students usually do very well in the competition, but this year one

of our students, Hallie Sitter, was chosen as the top female winner for all students in District 1 (Lake County) of the Indiana American Legion! Hallie scored perfectly on the multiple-choice portion of the test and her essay was selected from about 1,200 other students in our region as the top essay submission.




Hallie was honored for her achievement by the District 1

# Why Highland Christian School?

Determining what is best for our children academically isn't a decision we take lightly. Every spring we found ourselves asking the same question, "What are we going to do for school next year?" As my own academic path was a predictable one – attending the neighborhood's public school and remaining in the same system for grades 1-12, I used to think that whatever path we chose for our children's education would be consistent throughout their school-aged years. I quickly learned that this is not the case, and the answer to our question would not be a one-size-fits-all answer. This is why our three children have had a variety of experiences over the past 10 years, including attending Montessori, a private preschool, the public school where we live, and homeschooling.

After five years of homeschooling, spring 2021 came around and we felt God prompting us to reevaluate our situation once again. We began our search by communicating with the local public school and visiting a nearby private school for our soon to be freshman, 6th grader and kindergartner. Within a few weeks, God made it clear that we hadn't found the right fit yet, so we scheduled a tour at Highland Christian School.

We were instantly impressed with the school's attempt to meet the needs of each individual (WIN time, Power Hour, and leveled reading groups to name a few) and the variety of programs available to engage and challenge students (Quest, Project Lead the Way, etc.). As pleased as we were with the potential academic opportunities our boys would have at HCS, we were struck even more by the welcoming and encouraging Christian atmosphere of the school and the opportunity for their spiritual growth. This was the clarity we needed to move forward and felt confident enrolling our boys for the 2021-2022 school year.

Fall approached, and we quickly settled into our new routines at HCS. It didn't take long to reaffirm the choice we had made for our family. Clearly, this was a place where God's word is not only woven into all areas of the curriculum, but this year's school theme of "Just Live It!" is modeled and lived out by both teachers and students daily. Walking down the hallway, it is not uncommon to witness a group of middle school boys learning cooperatively– fully engaged in their project, hear a first-grade teacher speak affectionately to her students, or see the children skipping in through the front door, voluntarily held open by a peer offering up a cheerful greeting.

Now, a year later, instead of asking ourselves that predictable question, "What are we going to do for school next year?", we find ourselves humbly overwhelmed with contentment and gratitude. God has continued to affirm HCS as a unique place where our children have been able to grow not only academically, but also spiritually, physically and emotionally. And beyond the obvious gestures one might observe of the students and faculty "Just Living It" that initially impressed, we have been privileged to learn that God's love penetrates the HCS community even deeper than we could have realized- revealing Himself through the dedicated mom who faithfully prays for all of our children and teachers despite no longer having students herself at HCS, the sound of a chorus of recorders joyfully playing "Amazing Grace" together, the paragraphs of scripture memorized and simultaneously shared by fifty beautiful five and six-year-old voices, the artwork on the wall reflecting each child's identity in Christ, the kindergarten teacher who has spent her entire career pouring into students at HCS, and the reassuring words to a worship song carefully chosen for this week's chapel intended for the students, but are exactly what you need to hear.

For all of these things, and so many more, we feel so blessed to have become a part of this special community. Thank you, from the bottom of our hearts, for all of the hard work and energy that is poured into our children each and every day and for giving us the confidence that our children are exactly where they need to be.




# Camp Invention® By Mrs. Judy H. Zandstra

#### How did your story unfold?

After HCS, I continued to Illiana Christian High School. My initial plan after graduation was to go straight to a 4-year college, but instead, I decided to go to cosmetology school first. I aspired to use that trade to make additional money during college and then to have that skill for a flexible job later in life. I was determined to return to college but if anyone else can relate, God always gives me the last laugh by thinking I am going to plan my own life.

Eleven years later I am still fortunate enough to be modeling professionally and couldn't be more thankful for the friendships and experiences along the way. Within the last 3 years I gained my license as a realtor. God again played a huge role when I enrolled in real estate school. I earned my license shortly before the pandemic. Not long into the pandemic the housing industry boomed, modeling became extremely slow at the time and God provided a job for me. The real estate team I joined is Christ-centered with a life/business motto of Christ first, family second, and business follows. Their work ethic has been inspiring to be a part of.



On a more personal side, I got married around my mid 20s and because of my husband and the hard work we have put into our relationship, there are so many things that I just love about being married.

#### How has the foundation of Christian Education served you in your adult life?

I was very fortunate to have my parents put me through Christian education all through grade school and high school. I feel it played a huge role in my adult life. It was a positive environment of structure, learning and teachers who cared deeply for their students. I have many good memories that I can still recall from every grade at HCS. I even have friends I made in kindergarten that I am still friends with today.

### Did any particular teacher impact you in your youth? If so, who?




# Summer 2022 Building Projects


#### **Multi-Purpose Room**



#### **Additional Office Space**




