# Impacting the World FOR Christ; Impacted **BY** a Community that Loves Christ! By Mr. Kyle Weener, Principal

This summer, somewhat to my surprise, I found myself immersed in the NCAA women's softball championships. Quite frankly, watching softball was not something that ever drew my attention in the past, but after only watching one game, I was impressed with the storyline of the players, passion exhibited on the field, and in many cases, the faith-based perspectives. When it was all said and done, the Oklahoma Sooners, the reigning champions, took home another trophy - finishing the year with a whopping 59-3 record. When interviewed, many of the players referred to their team's mantra: AO1 ("Audience of One"). Team captain, Sarah Roberts, was quoted saying," Our purpose is to lead others to Christ through the game of softball." This team's story continually reminded me of Highland Christian - a community committed to undeniable Kingdom goals and where outcomes richly match the vision of the school.

Over the past few years, the Highland Christian family has continued to grow in enrollment, student services, and resources to best serve the community we love. In 2020 and 2021, Highland Christian experienced significant growth - amassing 20% growth in each of the past two academic school years - with enrollment topping over 550 students (Pre-K - 8th grade). As short-term and long-term solutions have been sought to accommodate mission and vision oriented students, we have made a number of changes to add parking, build a new outbuilding, and convert a number of internal spaces to create instructional spaces. These projects led us to a nearly 18,000 square foot addition that will be completed by the 2023-2024 school year. As work is already underway, our community will find an extensive list of activities in progress which include rerouting storm sewer, moving playground pieces, and laying the foundation this fall. It is a very exciting time to be a part of the HCS family!

In addition to enrollment growth, Highland Christian has been extremely blessed by an incredibly generous community. Over the past year, there has been tremendous support for our school's Foundation, thrift store (etc), and growth of long-term funds such as the Indiana Choice Contingency Fund, Long-Term Building Fund, and tuition assistance funds. With such strong support, HCS was able to provide teachers and staff historically with large raises, while maintaining historically low tuition increases. In an inflationary world, being able to limit a tuition increase to 1.96% is an incredible blessing.

As you read this edition of the schoolbell, I hope you not only see the lives that have been impacted for Christ, but also the ways that God has used so many individuals in our community to live into our vision to academically equip, Biblically ground, and spiritually nurture to impact the world for Christ. We are truly blessed!

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# OUR DEEPEST HOPE By Mrs. Vicki Huizenga

When we talk about Faith Formation, what do we mean? To grow in faith, is it enough to learn about God? Is it enough to know the Biblical stories to discover who God is? If not, what then is our deepest hope for ourselves and for students at Highland Christian? Our deepest hope is that students grow and walk in **FAITH**.

Faith Formation at Highland Christian seeks to connect students with God's story. Students need to KNOW God's story and DISCOVER that they are a part of this story. Students need to KNOW that they belong. The first question of the

Heidelberg Catechism echoes this deep hope: "What is your only comfort in life and death? That I am not my own but belong - body and soul, in life and death - to my faithful Savior Jesus Christ." For eighth grade, Food Fellowship Fridays are an opportunity for students to find their place in God's story. Deep questions, like Is Christianity the only true religion? & What does it mean to really love your neighbor?, give students the opening to wrestle with what it means to belong to Jesus and to His family.

For **FAITH** to grow, students also need to KNOW and UNDERSTAND who God is, how God has gifted us salvation, and what this means for living. To truly KNOW God and His plan for our lives, we need to spend time with Him. Instead of just memorizing a Bible verse for a grade, junior high students choose a Bible passage to study, examine, memorize, apply to life, and respond to with creativity. Time spent getting into God's Word brings a new understanding of who God is, how He offers salvation in Jesus, and what this means for life. The seventh graders also spent time reading Proverbs. Students discovered that "Wisdom is worth more than silver; it brings more profit than gold." (Proverbs 3:14) Seventh graders applied God's Word to their lives by defining in their own words what, according to Proverbs 6:16-19, is detestable to God. Arrogant eyes look someone up and down with disgust; judge people by their looks. Evil hearts choose not to include; or choose to let sin take over. A lying tongue talks bad about others; stirs up conflict. Spending time IN God's Word gives opportunity for the Holy Spirit to cultivate the fertile soil of hearts.

Our deepest hope is that students will choose **FAITH** in God.

The eighth graders were challenged to describe their personal beliefs about several tenets of the Christian faith: God, Jesus, salvation, sin, forgiveness, service, faith, heaven, etc. These students took what they learned from home, school, and church and claimed it as their own statements of faith:

The first, very important person I believe in is Jesus. I believe that Jesus was sent to earth by his Father, God, to save us from sin. I believe Jesus took all the pain for us and our sins by dying on the cross according to Romans 6:23. "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Finally, I believe in salvation.

I believe that God gives us the gift of salvation by giving us a second chance. Matthew 7:13-14 says, "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it." This Bible verse shows that there are two ways of life, one is the way of Satan, and the other is the way of God. Acts 4:12 says, "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved." God is the only thing that can give us salvation, and no one else has the power to do so.

Forgiveness can be life-saving if you know how to receive it. It's a gift from God and he is just waiting for us to open our hearts to him. God is ready to forgive no matter what you have done in your life. If you repent, he will gladly take you back with the rest of the 99 sheep. He cares deeply about you and wants you to come back to him no matter what.

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God." (Ephesians 2:8). The words are put in place well here because it distinctly talks about how the only way is to have faith in Him. Faith means to believe in God and stay loyal to Him. Faith impacts my life because I don't need to stress about the bad things in my past; it's all about having faith in God and doing what he says in the present.

What is our deepest hope? God continues to make ALL things new. He is at work in the hearts and lives of the students as Highland Christian draws them closer to Him as they learn to grow and walk in **FAITH**.

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# Gabis Arboretum



Then we have to let go. We send our students on to the next step – kindergarten. We know they're ready, but it's a little hard to set them free. We worked so hard together and they grew so much! We trust God's faithfulness and we pray for them. We also know this isn't the end – it's a cycle!

We know that God has a whole new batch of preschoolers ready to come to learn, to grow, and to achieve their goals. We are thankful that we are allowed to watch the whole cycle and take part in it!





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# **Discovery Center**

Success is the accomplishment of an aim or purpose. It can mean different things to different people. HCS staff members would say success can be measured with MAPS test scores, unit test scores, homework completion, student engagement, student faith formation, how well the day's math lesson went, and much more. HCS students might say that success is getting test scores that meet standards, having friends to spend time with at recess, being the fastest runner in gym class, going beyond an AR goal, winning the championship game in the basketball tournament, buying just the right snacks at the Thursday snack table, and much more. For one of the 2021-2022 DC students, success meant meeting standards on reading tests, passing the I-READ test, remembering to turn in his homework, and having a winning record with the games he played with Mrs. Amber Powell and myself. **Here is his story:** 

This student began the school year with some special needs. He had recently been diagnosed with dyslexia and with ADHD. Based on his diagnoses and on his test scores, we decided that he should come to the Discovery Center for both reading and spelling instruction. The Discovery Center is a place for students who learn in different ways, so this was a good fit for him.

At first this student was not happy with the plan set for him, but as time went on, he and I got to know each other better, and he adjusted. We learned quite a bit about each other in the first few weeks and months of the school year. I learned that he has a vast knowledge of information about a variety of topics that he loves to share. He learned that he was allowed to share a few bits of information at the beginning of class before we got to work on our reading lessons. I learned that he was created with a need for speed. He learned to slow down sometimes and think carefully when doing classwork and tests. I learned that he had great insights when discussing the stories we read. He learned how to find text evidence when answering comprehension questions. I learned that he loves reading games. He learned the sounds and spellings of vowel teams by playing some of our reading games.

Through novel studies, reading stories in the textbook, the Read Naturally program, Wilson reading and spelling, IXL, I-READ practices, and lots of activities and games, we worked hard to grow his reading and spelling skills during his DC times. Through Orton Gillingham (OG) tutoring and Interactive Metronome (IM), he worked hard to develop his reading and focusing skills. Through helping him study for tests, making sure he completed his spelling homework, and rereading the stories we did in school, his parents worked hard to help him develop his reading, spelling, and study skills. Because of all of this, he succeeded at becoming a much better speller than he was at the beginning of the year. He spelled words correctly on his tests, but he also gained a better knowledge of how to use spelling patterns in daily writing. He succeeded at learning how to write complete sentences and how to use some words from a question to craft a complete sentence answer. He succeeded at meeting his AR goal each quarter. He succeeded at learning new vocabulary words. He succeeded at learning how to read and understand both fiction and nonfiction stories. He succeeded at remembering to turn in his completed homework. He succeeded when he passed the I-READ test this spring. He succeeded by increasing his reading skills so much that he will not need DC reading next year.

To this student, I am so proud of you! To his parents, thank you so much for all of your hard work and for partnering with me. To the other teachers who taught this student, thank you for your work with him. To our faithful God, thank you for answering many prayers for this student and for each of the DC students.

voting was completed, their Airplane chair won "Fan Favorite" over all the chairs submitted. Congratulations to all these amazing artists!

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
# Readathon

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# Foundational Faithfulness

One of my favorite stories in the Bible is when the Israelites cross the Jordan River into the Promised Land. But it's not the triumph of the new land or the promised home that digs deep in my heart. Joshua 3:15-4:9 tells of the crossing through a river at flood stage. In the midst of flood stage, God gives the Israelites dry ground to cross over. And as proof of their crossing, they are commanded to collect twelve stones from the middle of the river bed, from the place where the priests had stood with the ark, and carry them to the new land and build a memorial with them. Verse 9 ends with the phrase "And they are there to this day." Hundreds of years later, Israel could come back and see the twelve stones. I love so many things about this part of the story, but three things stand out to me that I see in our goals as a foundation for Highland Christian.

First, the task ahead is intimidating. A river at flood stage is defined as covering areas that are not normally covered by water and cause an inconvenience or a threat to life and property. Some definitions include the idea that it causes economic hardship along the river. Second, the stones at the bottom of the river have been there for a long time. They are still there because they are heavier than the water can easily move along the course of the river. And third, the stones are not the goal of the river crossing, but they are a physical reminder of the provision of God.

It wouldn't be a stretch to say we are at an economic flood stage. Perhaps not

a 100 year flood, but the economic strain is greater than we have faced in a long time and it makes life difficult, especially as we try to practice good stewardship of the money God has given us and use some of that to train up our children in the way they should go. The Foundation regularly looks at our resources through the lens of a world that could drastically change in a very short period of time, and we seek to be ready to react and serve Highland Christian School.

Our stones at the bottom of the river are the commitments we have all made as constituents to support the school. Firm, not easily moved by rising waters, and known to God despite the turbulence of the flood rushing over us. The floods will come, but they will not carry us away. And our ability to follow His provision, bring our commitments out of the flood waters and lay them on dry land will stand as testimony to His name for generations to come. We are not building our foundation for our own glory, but as a celebration of His faithfulness.

# HCS Partners with Enrollment Catalyst

This past Spring, Highland Christian School consulted with **Rick Newberry** of Enrollment Catalyst, to help guide our efforts as we prepare a new school improvement plan. In the course of his time with us, Mr. Newberry conducted a number of surveys, focus groups, and interviews with parents, employees and long-term supporters to evaluate our efforts with regard to enrollment,



communication, and overall constituent satisfaction. *Thanks to each of you who completed the surveys and all those who participated in the focus groups!* 

We gleaned a great deal from your input and receive it as guidance for ranking priorities as we establish goals for the upcoming accreditation cycle. In addition to the constructive criticism, we were certainly affirmed and encouraged by your support! Mr. Newberry used your responses to calculate a "net promoter score". This is a rating he uses to codify a school's position - positively or negatively – within their community. It is calculated based on the types of feedback a school receives and can fall anywhere between -100 and +100. In the raw data, survey respondents are identified as promoter, detractor or passive. The net promoter score is the difference between the promoters and detractors. **Highland Christian School was given a net promoter score of 76 which is the highest number Rick has ever seen!** 

We were certainly delighted to receive such a score! Thank you for your continued commitment, honest feedback, and willing support as we are always seeking to be better at what we do. We look forward to sharing more details from these reports in the coming months.
