Row the Boat

After graduating from college and getting married to my beautiful wife, Abby, we made Kalamazoo, Michigan home. As newlyweds, living a mile away from my in-laws, we spent a significant amount of time with family, at our church, and enjoying all that our community had to offer. As Kalamazoo is a college town, we enjoyed following Western Michigan University's football team. In an unprecedented rise during the 2016 season, Coach PJ Fleck led the Broncos to a 11-1 record and school record #15 ranking in the AP Poll. His catch phrase "Row the Boat" became a city-wide mantra as the entire community celebrated the team's exciting victories. Now coaching for the University of Minnesota, Coach Fleck still uses this saying.

Why "Row the Boat"? Coach Fleck understood the importance of teamwork and the importance of a unified vision for every individual that was a part of the team. At Highland Christian, we do share the same 'row the boat' mantra - expressed through our strongly held vision to academically equip, Biblically ground, and spiritually nurture to impact the world for Christ.

In Lynn Swaner's book, "Flourishing Together: A Christian Vision for Students, Educators, and Students", she presents a compelling example of how schools can effectively achieve their mission and vision while seeing all constituents excel. The foundation of this flourishing begins with unity of purpose and vision. Throughout this edition of the School Bell, we want to share with you the many areas where Highland Christian is flourishing. What you will see is a reflection of the deep commitment and unified vision our entire HCS community has. Here are just a few highlights of these areas of flourishing:

Academic Achievement: In the 2022-2023 school year, HCS improved academic outcomes in multiple domains: 70% at 70th percentile, ILEARN pass rates, and MAP tests reported students grew more than one year in Math and ELA

Enrollment: With enrollment up 43% in the past four years, Highland Christian continues to be a destination school for Christian students and families.

Financial Position: Highland Christian continues to be in a strong financial position. While over a million dollars has been generated for the building project, other funds are growing to support HCS' long-term needs. This includes, but is not limited to HCS' Foundation, Choice Contingency Fund, Family Legacy Funds, Building Needs, and Other Operating Accounts.

Spiritual Growth: Highland Christian continues to improve service and worship experiences for students. HCS demonstrates a healthy school culture and a community that is focused on building faith in students.

Student Services: Responding to increased student needs, HCS now employs a robust student services team to support the emotional, academic, and special needs of our students. Last year, the student services team supported 291 students.

Support of Teachers: Highland Christian has prioritized increasing teacher compensation (starting at \$40,004), improving insurance and other benefits, and increasing teacher preparation time.

Retention: When families come to Highland Christian, they stay. HCS sports a 98%+ retention rate of students. Staff are retained at 95%+ rate.

Thank you for the role you play in our flourishing school community and for "rowing the boat" along with us. Whether you are a parent, supporting church member, donor, grandparent, or invested constituent, we appreciate you. Through the advancement of HCS, my prayer continues to be that the Lord's name is glorified and lives are impacted for eternity. **We are truly blessed!**

Data Drives Our Instruction

At Highland Christian School we use NWEA MAPs scores data to drive our instructional practices, frame our PLC team time and determine the best groupings of our students for academic success. Our academic goal for our students is to see our students demonstrate growth on their MAPs testing throughout the school year. To encourage academic growth, teams have taken various approaches this school year.

After our first round of testing in September, the sixth grade math team noticed a significant gap in student abilities with the grade level. After a review of the data, the sixth grade classes were shuffled around from homerooms to ability groupings to best meet the needs of students.

This restructuring of the math classes led to substantial growth in sixth grade math as demonstrated below as they moved the median percentile from 53 to 74 along with removing all students within the below 20th percentile.

Furthermore, the fourth grade team took a different approach with Math and utilized their WIN (What I Need) time to provide students with individualized IXL math plans. This individualized approach also proved effective as their **students showed significant growth in their math scores from Fall to Spring as outlined in the table below.**

While these are only two examples of how our instructional practices and PLC teams respond to data, there are countless others that have happened in our building this school year as our teachers are continuously evaluating how to challenge our students and encourage academic growth.

Sonshine Enrichment Center was founded in 1996 and has worked to provide a quality, Christ-centered preschool experience since then. Recently we made the decision to partner with the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI) and to seek preschool accreditation. This is a process that will take several years. During this time the staff will engage in a lot of self-study and look at ways to improve the preschool experience. The staff at ACSI will help us through this process and assist us to set goals that we will continue to work on in the years following the accreditation.

Deciding to embark on this journey wasn't easy, but we feel it's the best way to move our preschool program as we strive for excellence. We are always encouraging our students to grow, and we want to embrace growth, too.

The work will start over the summer and into the fall with curriculum mapping, and initial assessments. From there, we'll continue going through standards, progressing through all the areas of self-study required by ACSI. When we finish that process, a team will come to determine if our preschool has met the requirements for accreditation. That's when we will set long-term goals and set a plan to help us meet those goals. We're very excited (and a little nervous) about this process!

We would like to ask for your prayers as we walk through the accreditation process over the next few years. Our main goal is to continue to provide quality preschool that glorifies our Lord and Savior. We also wish to serve our community and reflect the light of Jesus to our students and their families. We pray that this process helps us do that even more effectively!

Fourth grade took on an adventure for Impact Day. With 28 chaperons tagging along, they embarked on a journey to **Feed My Starving Children**. Feed My Starving Children is a Christian organization that *“turns hunger into hope by empowering volunteers to pack meals for the malnourished in nearly 70 countries.”*

HCS students and parents created an assembly line to fill MannaPack meals. These meals consist of rice, soy, vegetables, and vitamins. While they were there, each student had a chance to pack MannaPacks to ship to many different places around the world. As a collective total, they packed 105 boxes, 22,680 meals, and fed 62 kids a meal daily for a year! Before sending off our pallet that they packed and filled, they were able to pray over the pallet as it gets shipped to help so many around the world. Students were truly impacted by the testimonies they heard and by the work that they did.

Putting the Pieces Together

Here at Highland Christian School we help students flourish in the area of mental health, social skills, and emotional

growth through individual or small group counseling. Our counseling program works with the entire student body to identify any students who may need extra support in order to help them accomplish day to day academic demands. One way we provide counseling is with the therapeutic strategy of bibliotherapy. Bibliotherapy is simply using books or stories to help young children process and work through personal problems. This year I helped a student who was struggling with the medical issues of a family member. Together we read the book 'It will be okay', by Lysa TerKeurst. This book talks about the relationship between a little seed and a little fox who are facing changes that are both scary and confusing. They both learn that even in the darkest of times, even with an experience that can be both scary and confusing, the Farmer (God), was always watching over them. After reading the book the student was encouraged and guided to draw their own characters in a story. Then while talking about the characters we discussed how scary it is when things change and when we don't know what will happen to the ones we love. We talked about how change can also lead to growth and experiencing amazing things we've never had before, like love for a new person in our life.

Bibliotherapy is a simple technique that any parent or guardian can also use at home with their child. Children of all ages often have a difficult time both understanding and communicating their own emotions, especially if they are scared something bad may happen. Stories can be a safe and natural way to deal with the fears and struggles in real life. Stories can give children a visual to focus on that is less personal and more objective. This allows them to feel safe to process and express their own big, uncomfortable emotions. Reading with your child can give them a healthy way to learn about different emotions, like anxiety and worry, and learn healthy ways to express, manage, and cope with these big, new emotions they've never had before. Interactive Metronome

Highland Christian School has been blessed to acquire the Interactive Metronome program. It looks weird but works on many underlying issues that contribute to learning difficulties and delays. Basically it tunes the brain and various parts of the body to work to a beat while tapping hands and feet in varying sequences to sensors that provide simultaneous tonal and visual feedback on a screen. This immediate feedback lets children know if they're too slow, too fast, or "super right on." Gradually they get on the beat.

Originally developed for musicians, the Interactive Metronome students noticed that as their musical skills synced with the beat, their attention, sequencing, reading, coordination, sensory, athletic, behavioral and even speech issues also improved. Interactive Metronome has since concentrated this brain training into various sequences of movement to help all parts of the brain get in sync. They've now added computer games to make it even more fun.

For 10 years, Mrs. Flory has been using this training with students struggling with adhd, coordination, autism spectrum, dyslexic, sensory processing, behavioral, and auditory and visual processing issues and parents and teachers have been delighted with the results. Children frequently go beyond the original 15 sessions.

It's recommended that students do 2 or 3 sessions per week with as few interruptions to the training as possible. Call the office for more information if you are interested in this investment in your child's future.

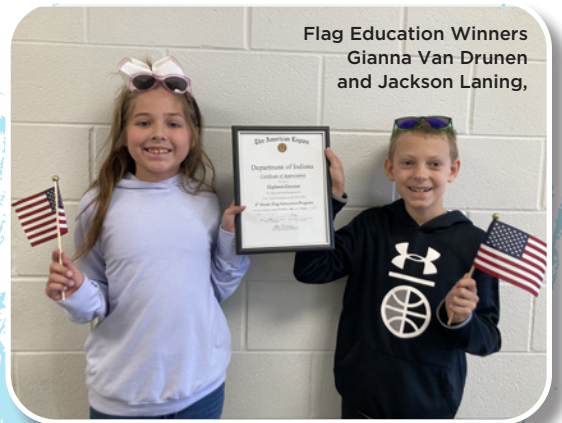

conference was to supply Ukrainian refugees with a "Welcome to America" basket upon their arrival in the U.S. and more specifically, our neighborhood.

In November, Svetlana and her husband and three boys arrived and in March 2023, Olga and Alex and their three boys arrived. They live in apartments in a home in Lansing, Illinois called **Welcome House**. Three churches and many volunteers help them navigate the rules in Illinois to get green cards and driver's licenses.

Our group helped the families in many ways. We held a baby shower in April for Olga, who is ready to have her 4th child. Our gift certificate from the museum went to her for baby products as they could not enter the country with any supplies at all. My leadership students brought games for the other boys, puzzles, diapers and items they thought would help them integrate in the

USA. The baby shower was a huge success and the students were rewarded by the family coming to our school to tell them a little about themselves. Also, when students had to make choices for our service day, called IMPACT, many of the 6th grade leaders went to Welcome House to work on projects in the home and in the yard.

ILMEC for a wonderful experience for my 6th grade leaders. This year they really got involved with their community, just studying current events and the Holocaust and trying to see what they could do in their world.

Expansion 2023 | UPDATE



Highland Christian has been blessed to have an amazing group of contractors and community volunteers who have helped push the new addition forward. As the largest project in Highland Christian's 114 year history, the 18,000 sq ft+ project will help serve Highland Christian's students and staff, while achieving Highland Christian's vision to academically equip, Biblically ground, and spiritually nurture to impact the world for Christ.

As the great need for additional space started to emerge in 2021, the building team has been working alongside our architect and Lagastee-Mulder for the past 18 months to ensure the new building best meets the needs of our students and school community. In all of our decisions, quality remains the focus. After receiving state approval to go vertical, the first block was installed on March 1. Since then, all walls have been erected, exterior brickwork is underway, trusses are in place, the courtyard pavilion has been erected, some floors have been poured, and we are close to 'boxing-in' the new building. As **Highland Christian remains on track for a July 15 opening**, we remain grateful for every individual who has made this project possible.

As organizations across the globe battle supply chain issues, Highland Christian has been proactively purchasing supplies

since January to ensure product is available the moment it is needed. Some examples of this include ordering 45,000+ bricks nine months in advance, purchasing the new HVAC units in January, and obtaining all new technology and classroom furniture through a COVID-19 grant (EANS II), which arrived the first week of June.

With final costs nearing \$5,700,000, Highland Christian has an emergent need to raise \$1,700,000 by July 15. With a \$4,000,000 loan from Providence Bank, if the school does not raise such funds, the school will need to borrow from the Foundation or obtain a second note from Providence. As of June 1, the school has raised \$1,381,297. **Will you join us in funding \$318,703 to avoid further extending the school's loan?** Through your support and generosity, students will be able to worship corporately in the commons, lessons can be taught in the outdoor courtyard, students will be spread out into smaller class sizes, and staff won't need to share two restrooms between 87 employees!

Again, thank you for your continued partnership. We appreciate your prayers, positivity, and heart to see the community of Highland Christian thrive. **To God be the glory!**

Now... For the Future

Everything we do now, affects the future of Highland Christian School. This is a weighty reality that requires careful thought and a judicious plan as we care for the vision and mission God entrusted to our community more than a century ago. While vision and mission remain unchanged, our school has changed dramatically in the past 10 years. Advances in the science of learning, increased enrollment, new frameworks, and diversified student needs have required that we look hard at who we are, what we are about, how we do what we do, and what will be required in the future.

Our current, multi-year campaign, **Now... For the Future**, is aligned with the goals of our School Improvement Plan, addresses both short and long term financial needs and focuses on increased engagement with our school community. In addition to providing annual budget support and funding for special projects, we will continue to pursue long term funding goals with an emphasis on the Choice Contingency Fund, Future Large Project Fund and Foundation Fund. Along with this, we will continue to identify and develop alternate funding sources that can augment revenue and charitable gifts.

While Expansion 2023 will take the front seat for a time, raising awareness and growing the assets of the **HCS Foundation** continues to be a top priority. In 2023/2024, the Foundation will distribute it’s annual gift to Highland Christian School in the amount of \$166,000. This is a notable increase over the previous gift of \$150,000. We appreciate the significant immediate impact this has on enrolled families and the long-term stability it provides for the school. Ideally, as the School grows, so would grow the Foundation.

With current assets at approximately \$4.45 million, the Foundation Board has begun to market our strategic plan to be at \$10 million in assets by the end of 2030. While lofty, we believe this is a necessary and attainable goal through some new internal initiatives and ongoing support of our generous donor base and constituents. As always, in all things, we hold unwaveringly to God and work for His glory in this! We are blessed to be part of community that does the same and that gives generously to ensure that Highland Christian School has all that it needs - both now and for the future.

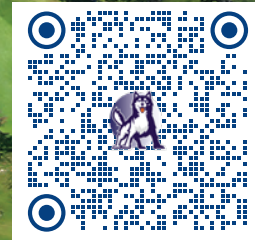
